



Case study **Natura 2000**negotiations and implementation (Habitats) shows typical problems of Governance:

- lack of administrative capacity
- bad assessment of present situation (negotiaton problem)
- strong non-transparent, non-instituitional 2nd and 3rd sector influence (hunters, powerful landowners, and developers): lynxes and bears focused upon



 bad information policy towards normal landowners (genuine, legitimate stakeholders)

... but Good Governance is not good Governance!

- Governance describes the steering mechanism in a political entity
- Good Governance embodies a strong value judgment in favor of
 - retrenchment of the State and
 - economization


... and is that what, out of all things, is good for Estonia?



The Basis of Good Governance as a world view is the New Public Management (NPM)

- NPM = transfer of business principles and management techniques from private into public sector,
- symbiotic with and based on a neo-liberal understanding of State and economy.

... but what was an option 10 years ago is not an option anymore today:




The question today is whether one is in the post-NPM (anti-NPM) or post-post-NPM (synergy) paradigm

ESTONIA

- one of the CEE countries closest to NPM models
- this development was possible because a large segment of the politico-administrative elite is (neo-) liberal or technocratic in outlook
- and those administrators (with a German-legal background) who have promoted the career system shared this basic world view
- Finnish model (without considering traditions and money spent) aided this tendency
- "Governance", if at all, used by active NGO's in order to foster involvement in political decision-making and contracting-out

So far, the greatest fortune of Estonian PA reform has been that hardly anthing has worked out...

... and it is strongly to be hoped that the same is true with the current Civil Service Law draft!



Estonia has opted strongly for the LISBON STRATEGY and for INNOVATION as the bases of National Development, i.e., on the dynamic economics of Joseph A. Schumpeter, but these approaches are not possible without a strong (effective and capable) State - see the following presentation by Rainer Kattel.


Study by Evans and Rauch of 35 developing countries (1999):
